GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Pass/Fail courses may **NOT** be used to satisfy any of these requirements.

To graduate from the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, a student must satisfy requirements of three kinds:

- 1) proficiency requirements, which indicate a minimal level of competence in written communication, mathematics, & second language;
- 2) distribution requirements, which insure that the student is exposed to disciplines outside the major field;
- 3) major requirements, which involve concentrated course work in one field.

COLLEGE DISTRIBUTION REQUIREMENTS

NOTE: These College requirements are separate from the University General Studies requirements. Only courses whose prefixes are specified in the following lists qualify as College Distribution courses.

In most major fields, students will be considered to have fulfilled the Distribution Requirement in the Division of the major (Humanities, Social and Behavioral Sciences, or Natural Sciences and Mathematics). Students majoring in **Exercise Science and Physical Education, Family Resources and Human Development, Speech and Hearing Science (and Women Studies in the 1996-98 or earlier catalogs), must satisfy Distribution Requirements in all three divisions.** Students majoring in Chicana/o Studies fulfill the requirements of the Division of their major concentration.

HUMANITIES: five courses of at least three hours each

At least three of the five courses must be taken in the CLAS Departments of Chicana/o Studies, English, Languages and Literatures, Philosophy, Religious Studies, the Interdisciplinary Humanities Program and/or the Women=s Studies Program. **Two of these three courses must be at the 300 level or higher.**

- CSH** Department of Chicana/o Studies: CSH courses only
- ENG** Department of English: Literature courses only, 1996-98 and later
- CHI, FLA, FRE, GER, ITA, JPN, LAT, POR, RUS, SCA, SPA** Department of Languages and Literatures: FLA 150 or any literature or Δ civilization@ course at the 300 level or higher. **NOTE:** Such courses taught in a non-English language may also be used to meet the Second Language Proficiency Requirement.

- WSH*** Women=s Studies Program: *WSH courses only 1999 catalog and after. 1998-99 catalog allows WST 413, 464, and 470 only
